It also provides a range of services, including support for identification of IP, assistance in filing of industrial designs and patents, advice in the management, licensing, and commercialization of IP.

In this matter, I am also pleased to know that the MRIC has set up a collaborative agreement since last year with a specialised law firm in India to provide such assistance to Mauritian inventors.

Through this collaboration, several inventors have benefitted from support allowing them to register and obtain protection for their IP, as Industrial Design, Patent and Trademark.

In addition, the Technology Transfer Office in conjunction with the MRIC's Research and Innovation Grant Schemes, also provides support for entrepreneurship and innovation aimed at fostering a culture of innovation and entrepreneurship in Mauritius.

Ladies and Gentlemen,

As we celebrate the World Intellectual Property Day, let us reaffirm our commitment to harnessing the power of IP for sustainable development.

I urge each one of you to view today not just as an opportunity for discussions, but as a call to action.

Let us use our discussions to forge new partnerships, to share knowledge and best practices, and to commit to using IP as a tool for achieving the SDGs.
